April 1915 LE BIZET

During this month, the battalion held the same line of trenches as it had occupied during March. The line consisted of 1 company in the front line between CARTERS FARM and PACKENHAM FARM with 1 Coy in support. Supporting company placed 1 platoon in LYS FARM 1 at B BUTCHERS SHOP in support of PACKENHAM FARM. 1 platoon occupied trenches between RIVER LYS and CARTERS FARM by night only and 1 platoon as carrying and working party by night only.

1st April 1915

Draft of 54 rank and file arrived. 1 rifleman slightly wounded

2nd April 1915 1 rifleman slightly wounded

6th April 1915

Enemy airplane dropped bomb near canal bank - no damage

9th April 1915

8 am. Heavy rifle and artillery fire on enemy positions.

During this month, no incident worth recording occurred. Work on communications trench was continued steadily - work on CARTERS FARM inner defences was commenced. Parties from 25-50 were sent from the battalion to work with mining parties at LE TOUQUET and the railway barricade.

Extended order drill and musketry was carried out. The weather during the latter part of the month was hot and dry.

The Bn crossed the Canal by the bridge about 7:30 p.m. and moved into LA BRIQUE to support the 2nd Monmouth Regt. During the afternoon the enemy had attacked with gas the 10th and 12th Bdes. About 8:00 p.m. a company under Capt. PILKINGTON moved up to Royal Irish trenches who were in support of the Essex Regt.

3rd May 1915

3:00 a.m.

Moved (less A Coy) into G.H.Q. line in front of WIELTJE. Heavily shelled throughout the day. Casualties – 1 officer 6 other ranks killed, 12 other ranks wounded.

7:30 p.m.

Received the order to relieve the 7th A & S Highlanders at SHELL TRAP FARM.

4th May 1915

Relief completed by 2:00 a.m. Front line trenches found to be in good order but support trenches very poor.

4:00 a.m.

Considerable hostile movement observed and enemy seen to be moving from left to right across our front. Heavy machine gun fire opened up on the enemy line, some losses inflicted.

8:00 am

Lt BROWN and a party of Grenadiers were sent to prevent enemy working down old Lancs Fus trench running N.E from farm. This officer commenced to build up barricade close to the enemy and advanced alone close enough to throw four or five hand grenades into them.

4th May 1915

10:00 am

This officer was killed and soon afterwards a second barricade was set by Lt ACTON 150 yards from the farm.

4th May 1915

4:00 pm

By this time the enemy had advanced to within 400 yards of our front trenches and had commenced a

short trench. During the whole day a very heavy artillery fire had been kept up (both high explosive and shrapnel) on our trenches, especially upon SHELL TRAP FARM

5th May 1915

3.30 am

During the night SHELL TRAP FARM was strengthened by another 1 1/2 platoons. Touch was gained with the 1st Welsh Regt. And one platoon of Cheshire Regt was posted between farm and 1st Welsh.

At dawn enemy were observed to have dug a short length of trench 300-400 yards from our front line and to have consolidated their positions 600 yards from us.

The day passed quietly until 5:00 pm when a very heavy consolidated fire from one or more battery of 5.9 Howitzers was opened on our front line trench. A considerable amount of the trench was blown away and a number of men were buried, 2 Coys suffering heavily. This fire was maintained until 8:30 pm and intermittent field gun fire was kept up until midnight.

5th May 1915

An attack was expected and very valuable artillery support was afforded by the Canadian Artillery. The support Coy ("B") was sent into the front trenches. Reserve Coy ("A") under Capt PILKINGTON arrived and was also sent into the front trenches. About the same time, Lt Col CUTHBERTSON and 2 platoons of 2nd Monmouth Regt came up shortly afterwards followed by 1 1/2 Coys of same regiment.

Capt PILKINGTON sent another platoon to Shell Trap Farm and one platoon to East Lancs breastworks. During night of 14th/15th 2nd Mon Regt relieved East Lancs. Regt

24th May 1915/25th May 1915 Night

By 2 am battalion held line from road C 21 to TORCO Farm inclusive. One French Company agreed to meet our left at small house C 15 C 6/1 where communication was established.

25th May 1915

New line held, from the left near TORCO FARM the French Switch ran to the old Divn Support Line. In places the trenches being fair but a sap for 100 yards had to be left owing to water. No part of the line could be called anything but part finished. Ledges require cutting and the line was poor. From the junction of the French Switch and Divn Support Line to the road C 21D the line was hardly dug. No wire existed and the line was commanded by the CROSS ROAD FARM enclosure. This had to be held as a forward post by one company but owing to the large content it was decided to hold the rear hedge strongly and the front lightly. On the right of the road the trenches had been half dug and the wire was poor, but field of fire good. To add to the difficulties dead point existed close up to the front hedge of CROSS ROAD FARM And to within 150 yard of the junction of Support Line and French Switch. FORWARD VOTTAGE had to be held as the enemy soon worked up to the road 50 yds N.E. of it. Long rye grass also proved a possible danger.

The men worked wonderfully during the short nights and the line quickly became stronger.

Sniper was dug in 500 yards in front of our right and bombing parties by night prevented the enemy working up too close.

These tactics served to keep the enemy at a distance and also caused him some loss.

25th May 1915

60 men of Lancs Fusiliers under Capt SMITH held E & N sides of CROSS ROADS FARM. 60 Lancs Fusiliers and 1 Coy of Essex Regt are in Div Support line behind French Switch. 50 men 4th NORTH Fus.

Quiet day on new line. Enemy observed moving near HAMPSHIRE FARM and towards our left.

Line shelled a little. During night enemy working party again shelled and a party under Sgt TILLEY stopped their work with rifle grenades and rapid fire.

During 10 days on Canal Bank Bn found working and carrying parties every night. Bn relieved by Kings Own and occupied support line between BELLE ALLIANCE & FOCH FARM. Casualties - other ranks, 1 wounded

The trenches as taken over from the French were in very poor order. Parapet was almost invariably too high and rarely bullet proof, practically no traverse existed and parados generally poor. A great deal of work was necessary.

Left of the Bn rested on a point 100 yards East of BIXSCHOOLE ROAD (?). 2 Coys in front line and one coy with 2 machine guns in support trenches 150 yards in rear on Canal Bank provided working parties for ESSEX REGT & 2 machine guns were also attached to ESSEX REGT.

19th /20th to 23/24th June 1915

Bn in support near BELLE ALLIANCE FARM where work on Divisional second line was continued at night.

23rd/24th June 1915

Whole Bn relieved King's Own in front line. Considerable progress was made in a new support trench 70 yards behind front line and in a new fire trench facing FURCO FARM.

3rd July 1915 Sjt 2228 Michael BROPHEY

5th July 1915 to 6th July 1915 Extended line one platoon to the right.

6th July 1915

11th Brigade attached on the left of the Divn. Line. We were shelled heavily during the morning – the enemy making considerable use of gas shells – a few Germans left their trenches of whom we shot four as they were retiring.

Casualties during six days – other ranks, 9 killed 27 wounded,

7th July 1915 Relieved by 2 Companies of 7th W. York Regt.

We had considerable trouble from an enemy trench mortar throwing a shell of 200 lbs; the effect of the explosion was as great as two 6 inch howitzers and the shell swerved violently to its right first before landing. The enemy shells seem to explode with greater force than had been experienced before – Chlorine was used in the gas shells for the first time in the experience of the battalion. The enemy was working hard during night on the trenches to our front.

21st July 1915

2:00 p.m.

Matched to GODESWAERVELDE, where we bivouaced for the night.

2:00 p.m.

Marched & detrained at DOULLERS

8:00 p.m.

Went into billets at LOUVENCOURT

27th July 1915

7:00 p.m.

Marched to & billeted at FORCEVILLE, where we remained until the end of the month.

August 1915

1st August 1915 FORCEVILLE

Remained in Reserve at Forceville. Continued training on drill, musketry, etc.

Night of 2nd/3rd August 1915

Relieved 2/Essex Regt. In the right sector of the Brigade line in front of Auchonvillers, with left on Auchonvillers – Beaucort Road and right touching 3/Rifle Brigade.

Remained in tranches for 8 days, which passed very quietly – practically no shelling and very little sniping.

Badly flooded out on 9th about 8:00 p.m. by a very heavy thunderstorm. Trenches consist of a wide front trench with firing step and snake traverse. Minimum Communication trench leading to large shellproof shelter. A second line & two long communications annexes leading back to Auchonvillers.

The French regiment had been in occupation since October last year had done a great deal of work – a large proportion of the trench had been paved – Officers shelters were most satisfactory. There was a marked absence, however, of good fire positions in a second line of strong posts and a new trench for a reserve company had to be started at once.

The German tranches in the edge of the valley & across Beaumont appeared to be almost empty. One or two patrols were encountered for 1 of the enemy was being accounted and before we were relieved.

10th /11th August 1915 to 18th/19th August 1915

Billetted at MAILLY and found working parties on 2nd and 3rd lines in course of construction. Very little opportunity for parade or training.

18th/19th August 1915

Relieved Essex Regt in same trenches East of Auchonvillers.

24th August 1915

Essex left 1 Coy in the village, a reserve coy. This company was relieved by a Company of the 2nd Monmouth Regt.

25th August 1915

Our two right companies relieved by 2/Royal Sussex Regt, 11th Infy Bde. D Coy under Capt R N COOK took over section 61 & 62 from 2/Lancashire Fusiliers – C Coy under Capt Dickinson went back into reserve. Thos change was necessitated by the whole of the 12th Brigade taking over all the Divn Line West of 11th Infy Bde – who continued to relieve by Battalions.

September 1915

2nd/3rd September 1915

Relieved by Dublin Fusiliers of 10th Infy Brigade and entrained for billets in Varennes.

During this double tour a little shelling by field guns and occasional sniping took place. The enemy worked by night on their trenches and an occasional patrol was seen. Otherwise it was a very quiet period. Very few Germans were seen though 2 or 3 were shot. Our casualties amounted to 3 men slightly wounded.

We commenced several new trenches in short length. Constructed two strong posts but concentrated chiefly on the completion of the large shelters. The weather became unsettled during the last week.

9th/10th September 1915

Relieved Argylls. Batt in reserve to Brigade. Headquarters and 1 Coy at MAILLY. 1 Coy COLINCAMPOS, 1 Coy ELLES SQUARE, 1 Coy AUCHONVILLERS. Continuing chiefly on second line and communications trenches. Very little hostile shelling

16th/17th September 1915

Relieved by Argylls and marched to billets at BEAUSSART. Billets in dirty and insanitary condition. Large working parties found all week, chiefly on trenches defending BEAUSSART. No opportunity of shelling Battalion.

22nd/23rd September 1915

Relieved Royal Dublin Fusiliers in trenches. Since our last tour of trenches a great deal of work has been done. First line had been narrowed and well traversed with sandbags. Communications trench cleared and sump holed and new trenches dug. Very little work was done by us as time chiefly spent on watching enemy. Very strong patrols were sent out and bombing parties to try and estimate strength of enemy. Very little hostile shelling and enemy not very active. Rained all week. Casualties, 2 men wounded.

29th/30th September 1915

Relieved by Royal Dublin Fusiliers and returned to billets at BEAUSSART. Large working parties found chiefly on water supplies to front line trenches.

October 1915

6th/7th October 1915

Placed in Brigade Reserve. HQ and one Company at MAILLY-MAILLE, one Company and one Machine Gun at ELLES SQUARE, one Company AUCHONVILLERS with one Machine Gun. One Company less one Platoon at COLINCAMPS, one Platoon LA SIGNY FARM. Two Machine Guns were kept in reserve at MAILLY-MAILLET. Very quiet time except for a few 5.9 shells in COLINCAMPS.

13th/14th October 1915

Relieved by Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders and Royal Dublin Fusiliers, marched to billets at VARENNES. Working parties of 200 per day supplied on Corps line. Scheme for improvement of Village drawn up and work commenced. This work should have been better and more quickly completed if carried out by Labour Battalions under RE Supervision.

21st/22nd October 1915

Relieved Royal Dublin Fusiliers in right sector (trenches in front of AUCHONVILLERS). 3 Companies in front line and D Company in support in billets. Enemy more active especially with Machine Gun fire at night. Strong patrols were sent out each night owing to increased activity on part of enemy patrols. Necessity for clear orders by patrol leader in case of inciting hostile patrols shown. One company 11th Royal Irish Rifles attached for instruction. Men appeared to be well trained and of good physique. Their chief weakness appeared to be NCO's who were not good disciplinarians. Very wet and cold weather prevailed during this tour of trenches.

Casualties: 1 Officer missing, 2 Officers wounded. Other Ranks – wounded – 4.

29th/30th October 1915

Relieved by Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders and marched to billets at BEAUSSART

Orders to join 6th Division for training purposes.

November 1915

5th November 1915

Left 4th Divn, 12th Brigade, and marched from Beaussart to RUBEMPRE. South Lancs under Lancs Fusiliers formed No 2 Column under Lt-Col PILKINGTON. Country very hilly and our Battalion troubled by fluctuation of transport in front. Spent night in billets at RUBEMPRE.

6th November 1915

Resumed march at 9:00 am and reached final destination at BERTAUCOURT at 1:30 p.m. Men stood march well, only a few cases carried in ambulances supplied.

Training under Brigade arrangements; 12th brigade split up, Essex Regt join 109 Bde, and Lancashire Fusiliers 108th Bde. 11th and 14th Royal Irish Rifles take their place in 12th Brigade. Special classes of instruction started in Bombing, Machine Gun, Transport, Signalling and Sniping. Remainder of Battalion chiefly occupied in Company Training and Brigade Field Days.

Continuity of work spoilt by having to supply working parties under R.E.'s. Much time and tr4ouble spent in improving sanitary conditions and providing good accommodation.

Marched out to VIGNACOURT (about three miles) and met 11th South Lancs recruited in same district as this Battalion.

27th November 1915

December 1915

I have been unable to locate the Battalion War Diary for December 1915.

January 1916

6th January 1916

Left 36th Division and marched to MERELESSART to join 55th (West Lancs) Division, together with 5 King's Own, 10th Liverpool Scottish and 5 Loyal North Lancs to form 166th Inf. Bde. Training resumed, special attention being given to Musketry Instruction., Grenade Instruction and open fighting tactics.

20th January 1916

Left MERELESSART and marched to fresh billets at METIGNY and LALEU. Training resumed under Brigade arrangement.

February 1916

4th February 1916

Marched from METIGNY to DOMART and went into billets at night.

5th February 1916

Marched to BEAUMETZ and resumed training under Brigade arrangements. Chiefly occupied with Musketry, Bayonet exercises and attack practice.

10th February 1916

Marched to AMPLIER and went into billets at night. 55 Division moving up to take over from French. Spent next day in huts

12th February 1916

Marched to BEDLES-AU-BOIS and spent night in billets.

13th February 1916

Marched at 3:00 am from billets and relieved French troops in support at BELLACOURT. Brigade disposition 1/5th Loyal North Lancs Regt and 1/10 L'Pool Regt in front line, 1/5 K.O.R. Lancs Regt and 1/5th South Lancs in support. Battalions going into front line previous day got shelled at BELLACOURT and lost 30 men. Our transport was sent up before us during night and relief completed without any shelling.

D Coy went to 1/10 L'Pool Regt in the front line to make them up to necessary strength. Trenches in very bad condition. No drainage system and no revetting done. Parapet too low and very thin in places.

Relieved 1/5 Loyal North Lancs Regt in front line. Trenches were deep in mud and impossible to clean in short period. Men served out with gum boots thigh which saved cases of frostbite and trench foot.

21st February 1916

Divided to hold WILLOWS and OSIERS with two Coys, 1 Coy in support in SOUTIENS and one Coy in village. Trenches still very bad and made worse by heavy falls of snow.

Their guns being always silent except for light shelling by Field guns. No enemy patrols seen and very little enemy sniping. Our artillery much more active with good results. Patrols out each night and snipers firing whenever targets seen.

10th Liverpool Scottish to attack on the right and 5th Loyal North Lancs Regt on the left. The boundary between being TRONES WOOD – GUILLEMONT Road as far as T25 a 0.8. Thence a straight line running North East, through the Church to the GUILLEMONT-LEOZE WOOD Road, to 5th Loyal North Lancs Regt. 5th South Lancs Regt to support the right Bn.

Zero Hour 4:30 am

In moving up valley was found blocked with troops and transport.

9th August 1916

2:00 am

Commanding Officer with Adjutant arrived at proposed Bn HQ A5d 89 and found 2 Bts 165 Inf Bde (5^{th} and 7^{th} King's Liverpool) in possession. Informed 166 Inf Bde HQ and were able to move up to Sunken Road T3oC.

3:00 am

Established HQ in Sunken Road. Company Officers warned of change HQ and sent for to explain changed scheme of attack as issued in operation orders. No time to go into detail or for Coy Commander to explain to Coy Officers and NCO's as attack was timed for 4:30 am. Owing to all NCO's and Bn and Coy runners having no idea of the country and the Sunken Road being crowded with men of 164 Bde, great delay was caused in getting the Coys out in position.

3:55 am

North Lancs just arriving and Officer in Command said he had only just heard they were going to attack

4:15 am

Our guns opened a heavy barrage and the Germans dropped their barrage within 3 minutes. Their back barrage line being on Sunken Road. Companies not all in position had to move this barrage. Those in position moved forward behind assaulting waves but whole line was unable to make headway owing to machine gun fire and heavy barrage. Whole line fell back and manned our original front line. Coys hopelessly intermixed with men of other attacking Battalions.

12:00 Noon

Orders to withdraw Cots from line and relieve 1/5th Loyal North Lancs in Left Sector in front of Trones Wood. Relief complete 5:00 pm. 5th Kings Own relieved 10th Liverpool Regt on our right also during afternoon.

Report on a raid carried out by the 1/5th South Lancashire Regiment, 166th Infantry Brigade, 55th Division, on night of 5th/6th November 1916 in accordance with this attached scheme.

- 1. During the 4th and 5th November the 55th Divisional Artillery successfully cut two gaps in the wire, each about 25 yards wide; these gaps were kept open during the night by occasional 18 pdr. and machine gun fire.
- 2. Zero was fixed for 12:30 am on the 6th, at which time a rolling barrage was opened on to the enemy's trenches in the locality selected for the raid and at two other points on the enemy's front. This was the signal for the raiding party to close up as near as possible to the barrage, preparatory to entering the German trenches. At Zero plus 5 the rolling barrage moved back by lifts of 50 yards per minute to a box barrage enclosing the area to be raided. This artillery barrage was continued with Heavy Artillery and Field Howitzers firing on selected points in the vicinity and sweeping the Communication trenches and approaches with 60 pdrs.

At Zero plus 5 it was intended that the raiders should enter the German trenches.

- 3. The raiding parties left their trenches as 12 midnight, 5th, and moved towards the gaps in enemy's wire.
- 4. The right party were delayed in reaching the gap in wire, the tape man could not get on, as they observed a party of Germans in the gap, and waited till the Germans disappeared.

On arrival at the gap the first group were delayed by concertina wire which had been run out across the gap.

A few of the right party succeeded in entering the German trenches but the opposition there was very strong, bombs, machine guns, trench mortars and rifle grenades being used against this party who were unable to penetrate and returned to our trenches on the signal to return.

However, the left blocking party of the right party got to, and occupied, their appointed position in front trench. The Corporal and two men were wounded but number 4099 Rifleman B. CORRIGAN remained at his post though bombed from both sides until the signal for withdrawal was given.

The right party withdrew on this signal, carrying their casualties with them.

5. The Left raising party was more successful. After penetrating the gap in the wire which was 25 yards wide, the first group formed block's in the enemy's trenches to the right and left of the gap.

The second group went straight through gap in wire, over enemy's first trench, and moved to South side of pond. Between enemy's front line, and EITEL FRITZ FARM buildings, (50 yards from front line) traces of wire were found. A path was found running from farm round S.E. of the pond to the communication trench at point I.5.b.66.46. One of the parties searching the farm were bombed and a machine gun opened fire from a communication trench about I.5.b.66.46. this party also returned at the signal to retire.

6. The party that raided the saphead at I.5.b.31.65 found it blown in and deserted.

- 7. Parties report generally that the enemy's trenches are 7 to 10 feet deep, very dry and well revetted with brushwood and timber, and trench boarded. Many deep drains were made almost like communication trenches.
- 8. The Artillery wire-cutting was good and done with a small expenditure of ammunition.

The barrage during the raid was well placed and the shooting good.

9. The raiding parties did not find any German casualties nor did they secure any prisoners, but were rewarded by finding documents in a dugout which definite established the already suspected presence of the 17th Reserve Division on this front.

New wire 8 yards deep on two foot six inch stakes has been put out running from CAMEROON AVENUE in front of GREY RUIN and

joining up with main wire round FREZENBURG line.

6:00 pm

Our heavy artillery fired on IDLE SAP |from 6:00 to 7:30 pm and trenches on and behind BELLEWAARDE RIDGE.

10:00 pm

We blew a camouflet under No 12 CRATER which did not break the surface. Part of CRATER GAP TRANCH and bombing post fell in. We fired rifle bombs and Lewis guns at COTTER CRATER. No action by enemy.

30th May 1917 RAILWAY WOOD

4:30 pm

Neighbourhood of BECK TRENCH and WEST LANE shelled with about 6 x 5.9's

The LEFT GROUP took part in a practice barrage in conjunction with machine guns on left of RAILWAY WOOD SECTOR.

The Observation Post destroyed was about 6 feet by 4 feet and composed of concrete and steel girders with timber on the top. No entrance from the outside was discovered. The enemy trench about here is badly smashed and is 4 ft deep revetted with brushwoods. 2/Lieut V Maudsley wounded and 1 OR killed. During the day our front and suppor4t tranches were shelled with 10.5 cm and 7.7cm shells. Our artillery carried on the programme of wire cutting and destructive fire.

Quiet day except for slight shelling west of WEST LANE at 4:30 p.m., enemy inactive. 2 OR wounded, 1 died.

2:00 a.m.

We blew a camouflet about 30 yards North of BLISS CRATER

6:45 a.m. An Unter Offizier of the 449th Infantry Regiment came into our lines at I.a6. This prisoner left his trenches North of the YPRES-ROULERS RAILWAY and said he had lost his way.

He states that the order of battle of his division is from North to South 484th Inf Regt, 449th Inf Regt, 456th Inf Regt.

For remainder of the day activity on both sides was normal. 1 OR B Coy wounded.

10th June 1917

Quiet generally but enemy shelled neighbourhood of BEEK TRANCH with 9.2's and lightly shelled WEST LANE and SOUTH LANE at intervals throughout the day. 1 OR C Coy wounded. 2/Lieut T W W ARNOLD returned to duty.

11th June 1917

Some heavy shells was fired on front, support and reserve tranches and YPRES was intermittently shelled throughout the day, and quite heavily from 4:30 p.m. and through the night, gas shells being employed. 1 OR A Coy wounded.

In the evening, companies moved into assembly positions, Headquarters being moved to WIELTJE dugout in the afternoon. The Colonel on Brigade instructions returned to Transport Lines as one of the two Battalion Commanders in Reserve. Major PILKINGTON, DSO, accompanying the Battalion into

action as C.O., Capt. D NISBETT, MC, as Second in Command and Adjutant. Capt A P AUBREY, 2/Lt D de PENNINGTON, Capt. L ROUGHLEY and Capt. H G WHITAKER commanding A, B, C and D Companies respectively.

31st July 1917 WIELTJE

3:50 a.m. Attack launched. Battalion was on the right of the Brigade front with the LIVERPOOL SCOTTISH on its left. Objective, the BLACK LINE. When the men formed up in artillery formation, outside it was very dark and difficult to get the proper direction. This was made much more difficult by the fact that the Battalion on the right advanced half right across our front. There was very little hostile shell fire to interfere with the advances. After crossing the BLUE LINE and getting extended, the sections got somewhat mixed but Leaders down to Section Commanders showed bravery and skill and reorganised sections as they advanced. After leaving the BLUE LINE, machine gun fire became more and more severe. the enemy had marked spots on which to concentrate such as crossing the STEENBEEK and gaps in hedges which were everywhere well wired.

The advance was made from shell hole to shell hole by section rushes. Support fire was given by Rifles and Lewis Guns until within about 200 yards of the OBJECTIVE when machine gun fire from SPREE FARM and CAPRICORN TRENCH to North of SPREE FARM held our men up. We had the help of two tanks, one of which crushed down the wire in front of CAPRICORN and then dealt with the trench itself and the other went past SPREE FARM and up to POND FARM, silenced the M.G. and enabled the men to reach and take the trench which by that time was empty except for men who were taken in dugouts.

Consolidation was immediately begun but owing to enemy aircraft flying low over the trench giving the position away, it was impossible to carry out the strong point where intended. Lewis Guns were sent forward into CAPRICORN SUPPORT on either side of the road, our trench was established on both flanks.

Casualties – 2/Lieut S H FIELD was killed whilst leading his platoon. 2/Lieuts SILCOCK, H F FALLAN, S H LOD, R G PULLEN, S W BAMBER were wounded during the attack. 2/Lieut J BEACH is missing and believed to be killed. At midnight our casualties were 1 officer 27 OR killed, 5 officers 133 OR wounded, 1 officer 11 OR missing. But the day had gone well.

August 1917

1st August 1917 CAPRICORN TRENCH

A barrage was put down on the enemy line as movement had been seen behind POND FARM but no enemy came through. Rain fell heavily throughout the night. Standing patrols were out about 50 yards from CAPRICORN SUPPORT. Our working parties were periodically swept by MG fire. An enemy sniper was active from direction of DON'T TRENCH but did little damage. Enemy fired at regular intervals with High Explosives on concrete dugouts in CAPRICORN TRENCH. Salvos were regularly placed on road behind SPREE FARM. A constant barrage was placed about 100 yards behind CAP TRENCH. Warning had come through prisoners statements that a counter attack was expected "that afternoon". Our artillery put down a barrage and no counter-attack materialized. At dark, enemy bombarded our system chiefly CAP SUPT and ground in between. 2 wounded prisoners were found in dugout in CAP SUPT. When bombardment died down, patrols were sent out 300 yards from ACP SUPT on right. There was no trace of enemy. Our left patrol saw 2 or 3 large patrols moving between POND FARM and FORT HILL> Rain still fell heavily.

The morning was fairly quiet with intermittent shelling. In the evening about "STAND TO" our artillery opened out on left in front of ST JULIEN. Enemy sent up a large number of SOS signals and his barrage fell all along the line. While this was still on we were relieved by the ROYAL IRISH RIFLES. This was carried out without many casualties and BATTALION moved into Brigade RESERVE in WIELTJE with HQ in WIELTJE DUGOUTS. 2/Lieut W M FITTON was wounded, 1 OR killed,9 wounded. The Medical Officer remained in charge of the DRESSIGN STN at RAT FARM (a concrete emplacement) although that was subject to continuous shelling all the time of occupation and many direct hits were made.

5:30 a.m. to 6:30 a.m. Enemy aeroplanes busy flying over our lines and firing their machine guns, dropped 2 white flares above POMMERN CASTLE and green and white flares on our right.

10:00 a.m. Practice barrage by DIVISION on right was put down o which the enemy replied by heavy bursts of fire mainly on the FREZENBERG RIDGE with all calibres up to 15cm.

7:00 p.m. Instructed by Brigade to work on preparation of forward Assembly Area for Battalions other than improvements on Battn HQ. This was communicated to Companies and work was commenced improving existing caves and linking up shell holes.

Divisional Artillery kept up harassing fire on strong points, roads and approaches paying special attention to old Battery positions. Lt Col LEIGH CLARE attached for duty to 166 Trench Mortar Bty with 2/Lt L J BAYLEY to R.F.C. as observer

Narrative of Operations, 19th to 22nd September 1917

The Battalion moved forward from GOLDFISH CHATEAU on the 19th September 1917 at 10 p.m. to occupy Assembly Trenches in OB line in Divisional Reserve. Headquarters: WARWICK FARM DUGOUTS. Troops were in position at 1 a.m. Our Artillery opened at ZERO - 5:40 a.m.

About 12 Noon I was ordered to reinforce the 165 Infantry Brigade with two Companies (C & D) both under the command of Capt. J H DICKINSON, M.C., were sent forward at 12.30 p.m. with instructions to report to Colonel DREW on the 9^{th} King's Liverpool R.

At 1 p.m. I went to brigade and received instructions to reinforce 165 Brigade with my two remaining Companies. I ordered these to move to shell holes round POMMERN CASTLE; Company Commanders to report to me immediately they arrived at BANK FARM. I moved to BANK FARM, arriving 2 p.m. Colonel DREW then informed me that my B & C Coys had been ordered to attack GALLIPLI COPSE and HILL 37. Instructions were then received from 165 Brigade that my two remaining Companies had to go in support of the 2 Attacking Companies. GALLIPLI COPSE and HILL 37 TO BE TAKEN AND HELD AT ALL COSTS. Captain H. G. Whitaker, M.C. was given the necessary instructions and placed in charge of both Companies (A & D), A Company to be in FRONT LINE. A wave of 4 Platoons in two lines. D Coy: behind in the same formation. Companies moved out at 3.30 p.m.. I went forward behind D Coy. Just as the Companies were passing SOMME, enemy dropped a heavy barrage. On passing SOMME, I met Captain DICKINSON coming back wounded, who informed me that HILL 37 had been taken at 4 p.m. I sent word back to BANK FARM. On arrival at GALLIPOLI COPSE about 5 p.m. I found a number of my men in possession with 2 Lewis Guns. The enemy then commenced to shell GALLIPOLI COPSE very heavily, and working backwards placed a heavy barrage round and about GALLIPOLI COPSE. The men were ordered to move slightly forward in the shell holes to avoid this fire, one Lewis Gun remaining in the corner of the building to bring flanking fire to bear. At 5.30 p.m. the enemy were seen moving forward behind barrage to Counter Attack. I joined my Companies at Hill 37. The attack was repulsed by Rifle and Lewis Gun fire, the enemy on the right getting very close to within about 20 yards, on the left to within about 50 yards. At this time I sent messages back to BANK FARM explaining the situation and asking for reinforcements and ammunition as both flanks were in the air, there was a danger of the enemy enveloping us.

At 7.30 p.m. I sent my adjutant back to BANK FARM to explain the situation. By this time, with the exception of desultory shelling and short bursts of Machine Gun Fire, the line was fairly quiet. There being no communication to the rear and having received no messages, I left HILL 37 at 9 p.m. and returned to BANK FARM.

Owing to the close proximity of the enemy in the counter attack, all messages received and sent since XERO, Maps and B.A.B. Code Books were destroyed so they might not fall into enemy hands. This now interferes with giving correct sequence of times. Up to the night of the 21st inst. Things were fairly quiet. Rations, Water and Ammunition were sent forward at Dusk. Owing to Machine Gun Fire and Sniping, it was impossible for any movement to be made forward of GALLIPOLI with the exception of occasional runners. Enemy again heavily countered at 6.30 p.m. night of the 21st. This attack was broken up by the excellent barn gas which our Artillery put down. The Liverpool Scottish reinforced 2 Platoons one on either flank of our position. On the night of the 22nd Inst., we were relieved by the 2/6th South Staffs. Relief was carried out quickly and without casualties. Before we left. Visual Communication was opened by us from HILL 37 to SOMME. This would simplify the difficulty of getting messages down from the Front Line,

Operational Narrative

1/5th Bn., South Lancashire Regiment

On the night of 8th/9th April 1918, the Battalion was billetted in ESSARS and adjoining villages.

A bombardment opened over the whole area at about 4.15 am on the 9th.

The order BUSTLE was received at 5.15 am and by 6.15 am all Coys. were on the move to their positions. A & C Coys, under Major W. N. PILKINGTON, D.S.O. to an assembly position N.W. of GORRE. Battn. H.Q., B & D Coys to LE PREOL Locality North.

At 1 pm A & C Coys were placed under orders of G.O.C. 165 Bde, (See report from Major PILKINGTON, D.S.O.)

Battn. H.Q., B & D Coys moved forward and held the line of breastworks from the CANAL to TUNING FORK. They were heavily shelled on the way and suffered some 20 casualties.

This line was heavily shelled until about 3 pm when the fore slackened.

At 5 pm Battn. H.Q., B & D Coys were placed at disposal of G.O.C. 164 Bde. Battn. H.Q. was ordered to join 164 Bde. H.Q. and was used for carrying ammunition and rations to the front line. B & D Coys were ordered to move, carrying bombs and ammunition to GIVENCHY to reinforce $1/4^{th}$ LOYAL NORTH LANS and $1/4^{th}$ K.O. ROYAL LACASTERS.

B Coy (with 1/4th LOYAL NORTH LANCS) was located as follows:-

3 Platoons in PICCADILLY and UPPER CUT under orders of C.C. D Coy 1/4th L.N. LANCS 1 Platoon in GRENADIER ROAD under Capt. LEE (C.C. B Coy, 1.5th S. LANCS) who, reinforced by 2 platoons LANCASHIRE FUSILIERS, had command of this locality.

On the 10th inst. 2 of his platoons from PICCADILLY relieved the LANCASHIRE FULILIERS in GRENADIER ROAD.

From 3 am on 14th inst. B Coy held – LE PLANTIN SOUTH GRENADIER ROAD NEW CUT EXTENSION

Until relieved on the night of the 16th by the 1st Battn. BLACK WATCH.

During this period (9th to 16th) the Company was heavily shelled at intervals suffering – 1 Officer and 35 O.R.'s casualties

D Coy was located as follows:-

13 & 14 Platoons in DEATH OR GLORY SAP & CHEYNE WALK

15 Platoon CAMBRIDGE TERRACE

16 Platoon OXFORD TERRACE

On 10th inst. 15 Platoon was moved to OCFORD TERRACE

On 11th inst. 15 Platoon occupied original front line exploring WARLINGHAM CRATER

On 13th inst. 13 & 14 Platoons under Capt. FILL held PONT FIXE, 15 & 16 Platoons WINDY CORNER.

From 14th inst., the whole of D Coy (under Capt HILL) held WINDY CORNER until relieved on the night of the 16th by 1 Bn. Camerons. From 9th inst. To 16th inst. D Coy suffered 42 casualties.

The Band, Pioneers and Concert Party were sent from ESSARS to reinforced GIVENCHY on the morning of the 9th. They did duty in the trenches there until th 19th inst. suffering 4 casualties.

Operations April 9th to 14th/15th

A & C Coys, 1/5th Bn. S. LANCS after assembling in field behind GORRE were ordered up to LOISNE CHATEAU to help 1/10th L'Pools who were holding LOISNE CENTRAL. The companies took up positions astride the road in front og the CHATEAU up towards the KEEP. Shelling had been going on all day but eased up at night. At 6.15 pm Lt. FRODSHAM went up to see dispositions of 1/10th L'Pool R. A report came round that the enemy were in dugout in left rear.

FRODSHAM and I crawled out through the houses and got back to supporting platoon which was sent up at once under 2/Lt DYMOND.

Taking the enemy in rear the attack was at once successful and most of the enemy were taken prisoners. The attack was brilliantly led by DYMOND and his Platoon Sergeant who took on his men firing from the hip in face of heave M.G. fire. Rfn. HOLCROFT single handed captured an M.G. killing two and capturing four of the crew. The remainder of the Company were driven back and it was during this that DYMOND was killed.

The enemy had wadded down the drain on the S. side of the KEEP and were quickly establishing themselves in a gunpit and ruined houses. Many of them were storm troops and evidently it was a determined attempt to cut off the KEEP. That night ditch was blocked with wire and a night and day L.G. post placed to command it. It was reported that enemy were cutting our wire. Bursts of L.G. fire were directed in it. At 8 am on 11th barrage was put down on front and supports and an attack towards LOISNE N. was dissipated by artillery. Enemy artillery very active in afternoon. A prisoner captured on our wire said attack was to be launched next morning. Steps were taken at once to get artillery to fire on farms where enemy was expected to mass.

The morning broke misty but there was no attack. Enemy shelling more intermittently in short bursts.

13th 1/10 were taken out of the garrison which was No 1 Company in KEEP and one in support. Wire was put out to flank towards LOISNE N. Northing further happened until relieved night 14th/15th.

During the tour a large amount of sniping was done towards TOURET. One Sgt. (CARR) claiming 55 hits, and gaining very valuable information for artillery targets.

NARRATIVE OF EVENTS AFFECTING A COMPANY OF THE 5TH BATTN. SOUTH LANCASHIRE REGT. DURING THE OPERATIONS 9TH TO 16TH APRIL 1918

On the morning of the 9th April 1918, A Coy was billetted at LES CHOQUAUX in Divisional Reserve.

At about 4 am a warning order was received to prepare to "BUSLTE" and about ¾ of an hour later, one to "BUSTLE"

The Coy moved off about 5:30 am with C Coy, under the command of Major N. Pilkington, D.S.O.

Route followed to positions of assembly at X.27.c.60.25.

From LES CHOQUAUX past ROBY DUMP on main road towards LOCON until turning to right at MANCHESTER ROAD (came under shell fire at about X.13.d.4.9 and then broke up into artillery formation by sections), crossed CANAL DE LA LAWE at bridge X.13.d.7.8. and proceeded in diamond formation between LOISNE Stream, and road running from LES GLATIGNIES to LE HAMEL, clearing LE HAMEL on the N.E. side to cross fields in X.27.a. thence to BUSTLE point.

ACTION TAKEN ON ARRIVAL AT BUSTLE POINT

We took up temporary positions in shell holes about 7 am, issued picks and shovels, and dispatched two patrols, one through GORRE and one towards LOISNE to get in touch with the situation.

At about 9.30 am the fog lifted a little and we moved in a N.E. direction taking up a position and digging in about X.27.d.05.85 to X.27.d.20.50 with two platoons, keeping the other two platoons in reserve at X.27.c.40.60. AT about 2 pm I had orders to report to Brigade H.Q. LOISNE CHATEAU and received instructions to take up a positions covering the CHATEAU from the N.E.

I reconnoitered the ground and had the Company in position by about 4.20 pm, and proceeded to dog in (as per sketch map). These positions were held until the night of 13th/14th April, during which time we consolidated positions and wired the front facing N.E. and around the posts.

On the night of 13th/14th we sent 3 Platoons forward and relieved our C Coy. In shell hole positions running from X.22.a.90.10 to X.22.d.3.4. with Coy H.Q. at post at X.22.d.25.15. These positions were held until relieved by A Coy, 2nd Battn. S.W. Bordrs. (1st Division) on the night of 15th/16th, and on relief proceeded to BURBURE.

Trench strength of A Copy about 136.

BRIEF ACCOUNT OF THE PART TAKEN BY B COY. , 5^{TH} SOUTH LANCS. REGT. IN OPERATIONS $9^{TH} - 16^{TH}$ APRIL, 1918

On the night of 8th/9th April the Battalion was billeted at ESSARS.

At 4.30 am on the 9th April the enemy bombardment opened and the billets of the Coy came under shell fire. The Coy fell in and on receipt of the order to proceed to "BUSTLE" positions, moved off to LE PREOL N Defences, taking the route LA CROIX DE FER – LA BASSEE CANAL, and being under shell fire of varying intensity all the way. On arrival at the wood the defences from ROUTE 20 to the CANAL BAMNK at F.11.c.5.7 were occupied and touch was obtained with GLOUCESTERS on S. of the CANAL and with D Coy of 5th South Lancs. N of ROUTE 20. About noon, the shell fire and M.G. fire which had been coming from the N. slackened in intensity. During the morning a Straggler's Post on the CANAL BANK had guided a large number of men mostly T.M. Battery into the defences which were then very fully manned.

About 5.30 I received orders to withdraw the Coy from the defences and report to 164 Bde H.Q. to which B Coy was to be attached, and acting on further orders received from G.O.C., 164 Bde, took my C|oy up to GIVENCHY to reinforce $1/4^{th}$ L.N. Lancs. I was instructed to hand over three platoons to Company Commanders of his Battn. As reinforcements for duty in NEW CUT – PICCADILLY etc., and to take the remaining platoon to GRENADIER ROAD to form along with 2 platoons of the Lancashire Fusiliers a defensive flank from the top of NEW CUT EXTENSION down GRENADIER ROAD to WINDY CORNER. I was placed in charge of all the troops on this defensive flank.

The night was quiet, but next day the trenches were steadily shelled. There were no shelters ot dugouts for the men, who were compelled to live in the trenches day and night, but they behaved magnificently and showed a splendid spirit.

On the evening of the 10th the 2 platoons of Lancashire Fusiliers in GRENADIER ROAD were withdrawn and replaced by 2 of the other platoons of B Coy and on the 12th, the 4th platoon also rejoined the Coy on the defensive flank referred to above.

On the night of 13th/14th B Coy was relieved of the section of NEW CUT EXTENSION that we had been holding and too over LE PLANTIN S. instead, and dispositions remained there until relief by 1st Black Watch on night of 16th/17th.

Of the behavior of all ranks I cannot speak too highly. In a trench where they were without shelter, even from the weather, under almost constant shell fire, often unable to get their meals or food of any sort for considerable periods, and without the satisfaction of being able to retaliate since they were so placed as to have no view of the enemy, they were one and all cheerful and ready for any emergency at all times. The behavior of the stretcher-bearers in particular was beyond all praise and doubtless saved many lives by the promptitude which they attended to all casualties under shell fire.

ACCOUNT OF MINOR OPERATION BY 1/5TH S.LAN.R. 19TH JUNE 1918

AT 1:10 a.m. a party of 2 Officers and 60 O.R. under command of Lieut R L LEAKE from the Right Battalion ($1/5^{th}$ S.LAN.R.) raided the O.B.L. between WILLOW ROAD and YELLOW ROAD under cover of an Artillery, T.M. and M.G. Barrage

The party succeeded in entering the O.B.L. but found the trench badly knocked about and no enemy there.

The enemy fired a very large number of lights – white, double green, double red, and double orange – the majority of which were fired from behind the O.B.L. The hostile artillery reply was slight, being chiefly directed against A.7.b.8.7 and A.8.a.2.8. An enemy M.G. firing from A.2.b.9.8. (Approx) was active throughout the operation; fortunately the majority of the bullets were high.

Our casualties were 1 killed, 3 missing and 5 wounded, including 2nd Lieut H W FRIGHT, who although hit in the thigh stayed with Lieut LEAKE until the end of the operation.

All was quiet by 1:40 a.m.

Two Germans seen by left flanking party in a shell-hole post close to LLOYD'S AVENUE. They threw a bomb wounding 4 of our men and then made off, our men being prevented from following them by a belt of apron wire reinforced by trip wire.

The wire in front of O.B.L. seemed to have been neglected and no signs of recent work were seen in the breastworks.

The support given by the Heavy and Field Artillery was excellent.

The return showing the casualties received in the Raid this morning has since turned out to be incorrect. The OC 1/5th S.Lancs. Regt. reported at 4:30 p.m. that the total number of casualties is 20 and not 12 as previously reported, and that included in the number are 4 missing and not 1 as previously reported. That this number of men should have been missing unbeknown to the Commanding Officer and to the Officers who took part in the Raid, for the best part of a day, is inexplicable.

I have ordered the Officer Commanding the Battalion to make every endeavour to recover the bodies, and so to remove what must, if they are left in NO MAN'S LAND' remain a slur on the good name of his Battalion.

I forward herewith for the information of the Major General the statement of the Officer Commanding the 1/5th South Lancashire regt. regarding the discrepancies in his casualty return submitted after the Raid carried out by his Battalion, and also certain details regarding the missing men.

- a) I am ordering a further enquiry into the reason why, when the Stretcher Bearers were told by the wounded men where one of the other two wounded was lying, they failed to find him and bring him in.
- b) The circumstances surrounding the leaving out of the body of Rifleman JONES through not creditable in the way that no credit can ever be attached to a Unit which leaves its dead or wounded behind in a minor enterprise, are explained and the circumstances being as reported by the O.C. Party, I feel that he was justified in leaving the dead man and bringing in the wounded man, is as he states it was not possible to bring them both in.
- c) I have nothing to state regarding the fourth man who was reported last seen going forward.

The facts as brought out are as a whole, of an unsatisfactory nature, but the most unsatisfactory of all is the failure on the part of the Battalion Commander and of the O.C. Raid to ensure the roll being called on the return of the party and consequently no one knowing until 12 hours afterwards that there were four, and not one man missing. It is not one of the details I went into with the Commanding Officer because that Officer has been planning and carrying out raids for a very long time and ought better than anyone else to have known of the importance of arranging for the calling of the Roll, and that he did not do so is both unthinkable and inexplicable.

I have nothing further to add except to state that I have ordered the Battalion to send out another search party tonight and have made known my dissatisfaction with the facts as disclosed, to the Officer Commanding the Battalion.

Search parties working in NO MAN'S LAND last night found no trace of men missing from Raiding Party. The Search Party contained a Sergeant and 3 Privets from the detachment the men were missing from; they had immediately volunteered for the work.

I have no wish to make excuses for regrettable incidents which no one feels more keenly than the Officers and Men of the Raiding Party, but in justice to the latter I would ask permission to draw the attention of the Brigadier General Commanding to the following points:-

- (a) it is pretty definitely established that the two Men missing from the Left Section did not go forward at all. A shell which landed amongst three of this party wounded one man in the hand; this wounded man saw one of the other two lying in a shellhole saying he was wounded. The wounded man told the Stretcher Bearers where the man was.
- (b) <u>The dead man left close to the O.B. Line</u> His body was being brought in by a Stretcher Bearer who did exceptionally good work throughout the night. When a man was wounded beside him, the man's body was left (after taking his Paybook) and the wounded man was brought in.
- (c) The fourth man missing was last seen crossing the wire of the O.B. Line going forward

The point which I wish to make is that with the exception of the body left close to the O.B. Line all the casualties <u>missing</u> occurred on the way <u>forward</u> whereas most of the wounded casualties occurred on the way back and they were brought in.

The fact that the area raised comprised about 7.000 sq. yards of ground covered with long grass and several old tranches, plus ditches and shell holes, helps to explain why the missing were not collected on the return journey.

Patrol Operation, 2:00 a.m., 20th July 1918

The patrol (1 officer and 13 OR) assembled apparently unobserved by the enemy about 150 yards E.N.E. of the Northern end of CAILLOUX KEEP. The fall of the shells of flank guns of barrage had been carefully observed and the best line of assembly definitely located.

The artillery barrage came down accurately at 2:00 a.m. and immediately it lifted the patrol formed in pairs at intervals of 5 to 10 yards, moved quickly forward and thoroughly searched the ground within the area of the objective. No enemy were found except one or two dead – not recently killed. The patrol (illegible) until all artillery fire had ceased. The protective barrage had been well defined and was very effective.

Wire was encountered just about the assembly position but is wasn't a serious obstacle.

It is considered that the enemy (a) anticipated attack owing to recent artillery fire and had withdrawn from posts or (b) the relative shortness of the dark portion of the night prevented him from putting out the wiring and covering parties located the night before.

SECRET PATROL ORDER

On August 6th, as soon after 8:00 a.m. as possible a Fighting Patrol consisting of 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON and four Other Ranks will enter the O.B.L. about its junction with LLOYD'S AVENUE and search Northwards for any enemy post. Any enemy encountered will be killed or captured and every effort made to secure an identification. Patrol will not search further Northward than A.2.b.32.40

Patrol will have an immediate Supporting Party consisting of one Officer and with Other Ranks (with a Lewis Gun). This party will take up a position about A.2.d.10.90 and will be prepared to either move to the assistance of the Patrol or to cover its withdrawal. Great care must be taken to keep this party screened from the enemy's view, but the Officer must take up a position so that he can follow the movements of the Patrol.

In addition two parties will take up positions, one about A.2.d.10.35 and the other about A.2.a.50.55. The function of these parties will be to cover the flanks of the Patrol. They will each consist of one N.C.O. and four Men with a Lewis Gun. If necessary they will open flanking fire to cover the withdrawal of the Patrol. The exact limits of their fire will be pointed out to them on the ground.

The two flanking parties will not withdraw until the Patrol with its immediate support has returned to our lines.

The Supporting Party and Flanking Parties will take up their positions just before dawn breaks. The Patrol will move out with the supporting party and will remain with it about A.2.d.10.90. As soon after 8:00 a.m. as the Patrol Commander decides, the patrol will crawl forward and enter the O.B.L.

If the O.B.L. is found to be unoccupied, patrol plus the immediate supporting party, will occupy O.B.L. about A.2.b.43.15 and will lie in wait for enemy moving forward at dusk to occupy his forward posts.

In this event, the Lewis Gun at A.2.a.50.55 will move across to A.2.d.10.90 and replace the immediate supporting party which is to move forward.

"Z" House O.P. will be in direct communication by wire to the immediate supporting party at A.2.d.10.190

In the event of the fighting patrol being heavily attacked the artillery will barrage according to the barrage lines marked on attached map. The signal for the barrage will be ONE WHITE VERY LIGHT fired from the O.B.L. due East over enemy lines. On this signal the Signaller with the immediate supporting party will send "COD" to "Z" HOUSE O.P. and gunner will transmit to the batteries.

If enemy do not come forward after dusk, the patrol will return to our lines at 11:00 p.m.

Any prisoners secured will be sent down at once under escort to Battalion Headquarters.

<u>DRESS FOR PATROL</u>. Rile with bayonet fixed and dimmed with mud, 30 rounds of ammunition in pocket and soft cap worn. The Officer and two Sergeants will carry two bombs each.

Attached are narratives from Sergeant CARR with 2nd Lt. WALLINGTON'S patrol and the Officer in command of the immediate support.

Our casualties were 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON killed and two other ranks wounded, all of whom have been brought into our lines.

From speaking personally to both the Patrol and Supporting Party it is evident that considerable damage was done to the enemy, as he deliberately came over the top bunched, and had no idea that supporting party with a Lewis Gun was in the vicinity.

The patrol and supporting party are being sent down to the Divisional Reception Camp tonight for a rest.

MAJOR Comdg: 5th. S. LAN. R.

REPORT BY SERGEANT CARR

The part consisted of 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON, myself and three men.

We left the supporting party at 8:00 a.m. and entered the O.B.L. at its junction with LLOYD'S AVENUE at 8:15 a.m. and moved North-wards 150 yards examining shelters. The shelters had the remains of British kit in them, but there were no signs of any German kit.

At about 8:40 a.m. a German bomb dropped six yards ahead of me. I was at the head of the party and 2^{nd} . Lieut. WALLINGTON was behind me looking towards Boscheland. More bombs fell at 2^{nd} . Lieut. WALLINGTON gave the order to go back.

We went back along the O.B.L. and got out where the wire was poor to a shell hole at about A.2.b.46.00. Here we stayed five minutes and saw two parties of Bosche, 10 or 12 strong each, come over the O.B.L. While here 2nd. Lieut. DODDS' party on our left opened out with Lewis Gun and Rifle fire. The fire must have had good effect as the Bosche were coming over the top and presented a good target.

We retired again to the end of hedge on LLOYD'S AVENUE. As we retired another party appeared from South of LLOYD'S AVENIE and O.B.L. We opened fire from here also and after 10 minutes moved back to the post in LLOYD'S AVENUE. 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON was leading and was hit when near the right covering post about 120 yards from LE PLANTIN Breastworks. A sniper was also slightly wounded. 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON was brought in to the Bombing Post.

2nd. Lieut. DODDS Report

At 4:00 a.m. I took up my position. I had with me Sergt. BAKER and six other ranks with a Lewis Gun. There was no sign or sound in the O.B.L.

2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON and party moved forward at 8:00 a.m. I saw them enter the O.B.L. at its junction with LLOYD'S AVENUE and saw them work Northwards about 120 yards.

At 8:40 a.m. I saw a good number of Stick Bombs come over where 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON'S party had reached. I then saw the party work its way back and out of the O.B.L. to a shell-hole.

As they came out I saw two parties of Bosche, about 10 or 12 each, come over the top – one party from WILLOW ROAD and the other from midway between WILLOW ROAD and LLOYD'S AVENUE.

We opened fire with Lewis Gun and Rifles on the left party and then when 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON'S party had cleared we fired at both parties alternatively. The left party was completely dispersed and as we concentrated on the 2nd party, which was chasing WALLINGTON, a third party of Bosche then came over the O.B.L. and fired on us.

When I saw that 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON and party had got well behind us I withdrew my party. I found Sgt. CARR and all the party except 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON in the breastworks and heard that 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON had been killed about 100 yards from our lines.

I sent out two stretchers, one for 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON and one for Rifleman ANDERTON of my party who had been wounded. 2nd. Lieut. WALLINGTON must have been killed by Machine Gun Fire.

The Lewis Gun did great execution, especially amongst the first party of enemy fired on.

From the time of going out until 8:40 a.m. we received messages from O.P. that no movement was observed in or behind the O.B.L.

5th SOUTH LANCASHIRE REGIMENT OPERATION OF 20TH SEPTEMBER 1918

On the night of 16th/17th September 1918 the Battalion took over the outpost line of the Brigade on a frontage of 1 mile. At 6:30 a.m. on the 20th September the Battalion attacked the enemy's outpost system on a frontage of 1,250 yards, advanced to an average depth of 400 yards, captured 39 unwounded and 4 wounded prisoners. A fair number of enemy were killed in the assault (20 is a conservative estimate) and many more casualties were caused him by active sniping and Lewis Gun fire after the objectives were gained.

The attack was made with the object of covering the right flank of the 10th Royal Warwicks (10th Div.) who were simultaneously attacking THE DISTILLERY (S.17 Central)and SHEPHERD'S REDOUBT. The Battalion was informed early on the morning of the 18th September that the attack was to be made and objectives were indicated.

The assault was carried out by 2 Companies plus 1 Section ("B" Company on right, "D" Company plus 1 Section of "C" Company on left) directly supported by 275 Bde. R.F.A and a6 guns of 166 L.T.M.B. 276 Bde R.F.A. and Heavy artillery co-operated in protection of right flank of the attack. The position of assaulting troops at ZERO, the objectives of platoons and the line gained are shown on the accompanying map. Machine Guns of 55th M.G. Battn. Co-operated by putting down a protective barrage and maintaining harassing overhead fore on enemy's lines for several hours during the day. "A" Company (with one sub-section of M.G.'s attached) were given the task of protecting the right flank of the attack. This company had its attached M.G.'s and six Lewis Guns, disposed on the line S.28.d.9.1 to Cemetery in S.29.a.

The action resolved itself into six separate platoon attacks, each assaulting Company having 1 platoon in hand. The artillery and Stokes mortars opened at XERO and lifted from the different objectives at times varying from Z plus 3' to z plus 7', thereafter creeping forward at the rate of 100 yards in 3 minutes. The infantry advanced at ZERO and closed up to the barrage. The Right Company (B) secured its objectives with little difficulty. The plan of taking the pumping stations from the south worked successfully. Very thorough reconnaissance had been made in the short time available and the assault was carried out with coolness and precision under personal observation of the O.C. Company. 15 prisoners were taken by this Company and at least two enemy were killed. 1 Light M.G. was captured, used against the enemy (3 belts were fired) and brought out of action. The right Company's casualties were 1 Officer and 9 O.R. wounded and 1 man (Stretcher bearer) missing. The latter had gone over to help right platoon of "D" Company and wither got lost and captured, or was killed by hostile M.G. fire which was considerable.

The left Company (with the exception of its right platoon) had considerable fighting. The right platoon crossed SPOOK TRENCH and SPOOK DRAIN (120 yards E. of the trench) without opposition, found its PILLBOX objective did not exist, the construction of the PILLBOX having only been begin. They then occupied the line of old emplacements along ditch S. of 23 Central. They previously lost direction through not recognizing objective, moved to the right on PILLBOX S.23.d.1.4. which was the left objective of the right Company. They shot down 2 Germans who were observing from the top of this pillbox. They suffered severe casualties from hostile M.G. fire.

The centre platoon, followed by O.C. Company with his reserve platoon reached SPOOK DRAIN about PILLBOX S.23.a.5.o. Considerable fighting took place here, about 7 or 8 Germans being killed and about a dozen prisoners taken. O.C. Company was severely wounded immediately afterwards, but not before je had personally accounted for more than one German. The centre platoon had pushed on quickly, seized the old shelters N. of S.23.Central and crossed the track S.W. of PIONEER DUMP. They captured

the first pillbox in PIONEER DUMP with 4 prisoners. This platoon was now reduced to 11, two of whom were wounded but carrying on. A Lewis Gun was posted on the side of the moat but the No. 1 was shot dead and the platoon came under heavy M.G. fore at close range from another pillbox s short distance in front. Having seen the platoon on his right being rather held up, the O.C. platoon withdrew his men on to the old gun positions North of S.23.Centra. He crawled back to the pillbox with 3 men to look for a German machine gun, which he thought he would find useful. The could not find a machine gun but found two Trench Mortars on mountings; they destroyed these with Mills bombs.

The left platoon of "D" Company (with 1 section of "C" Company attached) moved quickly up SERPENT TRENCH close behind our barrage which, excellent throughout, was particularly effective on this flank. The enemy resisted stoutly and bombed vigorously but the assault was made with a dash and determination which carried it well beyond the junction of SERPENT and NORA TRAMCHES. Touch was gained with the platoon on the right and with the 10th Royal Warwicks on the left. The O.C. Platoon was wounded shortly after reaching his objective. Machine Gun fire along SERPENT TRENCH was heavy. O.C. "C" Company, who had supported the advance of this platoon with Lewis Gun fire from the top of dugouts at junction of SERPENT and SOLACE TRENCHES as long as it was possible, took over command of "D" Company when O.C. of that Company was wounded. Owing to Officer casualties definite information from "D" Company's left platoon had been lacking, Reconnaissance showed that the position at junction of SERPENT and NORA TRENCHES was fairly secure although touch had temporarily been lost with the platoon on the right. Seven men from this platoon are missing. They were last seen in shell holes East of NORA TRENCH. Considerable enemy movement was seen in front and was heavily fired on by our own. Shortly before 10:00 a.m. the enemy heavily shelled SERPENT TRENCH and the Battalion on the left. Our artillery were asked to shell PIONEER DUMP. No attack developed against the Battalion's front but it is not unlikely that one was prevented from developing by the artillery, rifle fire and heavy indirect M.G. fire on to the area N.E. of PIONEER DUMP.

At dusk connection was gained between the two left platoons of "D" Company and an intermediate post established about S.23.b.10.50.

The enemy's artillery retaliation was only moderately heavy. His first S.O.S. signal was seen at ZERO plus 3' and generally along the line at ZERO plus 5'. His artillery responded quickly and his barrage was down by ZERO + 6' to 7'. The Division on the left put a smoke screen on the left of their objective at ZERO plis 3'. Machine guns of 19th Division opened fire at this time – our machine guns opened at ZERO minus 1 ½ ' but this did not appear to matter. The enemy barrage was heaviest on the right and left of our oline and along the RUE DU MARAIS which he enfiladed. The Right Company's Headquarters 100 yards E. of the junction of the EITEL ALLEYS was subjected to rather heavy harassing fire at intervals throughout the day, as was also the area about junction of SPOOK DRAIN and SERPENT TRENCH.

As soon as SERPENT TRENCH AWAS GAINED 166 t.m. Battery rushed up two Stokes Mortars to SPOOK DRAIN, the teams carrying forward their ammunition. This was done under considerable machine gun fire.

The Battalion was relieved by 1/10th LIVERPOOL SCOTTISH on the night of 20th/21st September – completed at 12:20 a.,. 21st September.


ADDENDUM TO NARRATIVE OF OPERATIONS 20TH SEPTEMBER 1918

In addition to furnishing 1 section (attached to "D" Company) to garrison the junction of SPOOK DRAIN and SERPENT TRENCH, "C" Company had the remainder of this platoon at the disposal of "D" Company for carrying ammunition etc. up SERPENT TRENCH. They made three journeys under considerable machine gun fire and formed a dump at the junction of SERPENT TRENCH and SPOOK DRAIN.

Another platoon of "C" Company was employed in reinforcing the two left platoons of "D" Company and giving covering L.G. fire from the top of PILLBOXES in SERPENT TRENCH.

A third platoon of "C" Company was employed – 2 Sections joining the remainder of "D" Company's reserve platoon to form a close support in SPOOK DRAIN – 2 Sections in escorting prisoners to Bde. H. Qrs. The latter two sections were subsequently used to link up between the two left platoons of "D" Company.

Consequently there was only one platoon of "C" Company (disposed in ADALBERT ALLEY) which dod not become involved in the operation.

The Battalion War Diary for April 1919 shows that they were based at Ostrohove Camp BOULOGNE under the command of Lt-Col LITTLE, D.S.O.

Immediately, groups of men were dispatched to the UK for demobilization, starting with 190 Officers and 220 Other Ranks on 1st April.

Diary entries continue until 31st July 1919 showing numbers of men embarking for the UK, but these were clearly passing through the Battalion and did not form part of the unit which had served in France since February 1915.

Men who had served with the Battalion continued to die from illness and wounds received. CWGC registers record details of those who died up to and including 31st August 1921, and these are listed below.
